FOLLOWING MEANS LEAVING- LUKE 9:57-62

Background: Jesus is having tremendous popularity with the people because of His **power** and **authority** over demons and diseases (Luke 9:1). Everyone is **"astonished**" and **"amazed**" at what He is doing. The 12 are having success as well, and in chapter 10 Jesus is launching a mission involving many others beside the 12. In spite of His popularity, Jesus has recently begun to feel **rejection**, starting with the **Samaritans** (v.51-53). This rejection will eventually come to a head in Jerusalem, His destination.

I. The "WHEREVER" disciple:

- A. According to Matthew's account this man was a **teacher** of the Law (a scribe).
- B. Matthew tells us he approaches Jesus by calling Him "teacher"-want's to be a student.
- C. He "volunteers" to follow Jesus, but look at the preceding chapters. (Jesus is enjoying popularity and his disciples are having success). He is eager to learn from such an amazing teacher. He wants to soak up all he can from Rabbi Jesus!
- D. Besides, what **better candidate** could Jesus hope for than another teacher?
- E. This man is focused on **where** he would be **willing to go** (assuming of course that Jesus would provide his every need...like He had just done with feeding the 5,000).
- F. But Jesus' focus is on what a person is **willing to leave behind in order to go**.
- G. So when this man refers to "following" Jesus, he likens it to "accompanying" Jesus.
- H. He's "along for the ride"... but doesn't realize the road is about to get bumpy.
- I. Jesus is already beginning to experience **rejection** (the Samaritan's rejected Him and denied Him lodging and a place to sleep vs.53) and it will only become worse.

J. Assessment of the 1st man - Following means leaving... A GOOD REPUTATION.

II. The "WHENEVER" disciple

- A. This man is **personally invited** by Jesus to follow (the same terminology as the 12).
- B. He most likely just watched Jesus tell the 1st man that there will be no comfort in following Him. This man acts like he wants to follow, but needs to post-pone it. Why?
 - 1 This delay, at first glance, seems to be not only **reasonable**, but it is **honorable**.
 - 2 Clarify-This mans father was not dead. If so he wouldn't be there with Jesus.
 - 3 He would, as a son, be expected to **honor** his father by burial & mourning (30 days).
 - 4 After this he would then receive his **inheritance**. Needed to be there to get it.
- C. He **assumes** because of his **obligation** to his family (and **to himself**), he can wait for more convenient "**timing**" in his life.... which is at some point down the road.
- D. He truly believes that it is reasonable and that **Jesus can and will wait** for him.
- E. Jesus tells him to **leave to others** what any of the **others could do** (Bury the dead).
- F. His focus should be on **good news** (the kingdom), not bad news death of loved-one.

G. Assessment of the 2nd man - Following means leaving... CONVENIENT CIRCUMSTANCES.

III. The "HOWEVER" disciple:

- A. He might be considered the **"but first**" disciple.
- B. He too had probably witnessed how Jesus had handled the previous two, and is ready to go. He doesn't need the **inheritance** from his household...just their **blessing**.
- C. His request seems **reasonable**, but draws a **harsh** response from Jesus.
- D. A few **points to consider**: about this man:
 - 1. Notice- Jesus had not asked him to follow. Neither did he ask Jesus if he could follow.
 - 2. He **assumes** that he can follow, but has one term (which Jesus denies).

4. Maybe Jesus knew that he would be going back to a family that would never understand this.

5. The blessing of his family seems to **trump** the call of Jesus.

- E. The expression "**looking back**" does not mean a return to the world or his family, but the reluctance to **break** with them in the first place. His heart would always be at home. This reluctance is what Jesus deals with.
- F. Jesus says you cannot follow me by looking **backward**s.

G. Assessment of the 3rd man - Following means leaving... A DIVIDED LOYALTY.

IV. Observations:

- A. Each of these 3 men's commitment to Christ was **nullified or minimized** by some **previous allegiance** already existing in their life.
- B. Each wanted to follow...on terms that allowed them to keep their current priority.
- C. What's more- every **excuse** for not following Christ whole-heartedly is related in some way to an existing **higher level of commitment** given to the **home** or **family**!
- D. Every excuse seems **legitimate** and even **noble** at first glance...especially in the culture of the day, until Jesus **EXPOSES** the real reason behind the inability to follow.
- E. Notice that Jesus doesn't **modify** His condition for anyone that would follow, regardless of whether they volunteered or were specifically called to follow.

F. The "Takeaways":

- 1. Following means LEAVING WHAT WE TREASURE MOST
 - a. Jesus knows that following and leaving are **inseparable**. What does it **mean**?
 - 1) Leaving doesn't mean we **abandonment or neglect**.

- Example- Marriage ...need to leave parents before you can cleave to wife. Doesn't mean we disown our parents...but now a secondary priority.
- 3) Means we can't give **primary** attention to **two things** at the same time.
- b. Jesus is always far more concerned about what we are willing to leave than what we are expecting to gain. We need less to distract us (Simplify).
- 2. Following means NO "DISCLAIMERS" (even reasonable ones).
 - a. There is no place for "somewhere", "sometime" or "somehow" disciples.
 - b. We never **dictate** the conditions by which we will follow.
 - c. If we try to dictate the terms we are not "following" as Jesus would define it...we are merely "observing" Jesus (often with admiration).
- 3. Following means NO "SUPPLEMENTS"
 - a. The first man viewed Jesus as a supplement to his 1st priority-his resume.
 (Following Jesus was a means to an end).
 - b. The next man saw Jesus as a supplement to his 1st priority-his **responsibility**. (Following now would be irresponsible).
 - c. The last man saw Jesus as a supplement to his 1st priority- his relatives.
 (Following would be better with a blessing to go with it).
- G. **Consolation**: Though it seems like Jesus is **discouraging** "followers" He is really **sparing** them from **a frustrating situation** they aren't prepared or equipped for.
 - 1. Notice Luke 10:1. Jesus sending out 70 others to preach ahead of Him.
 - 2. THE 3 DON'T FIT.
 - 3. The text never says that Jesus said **NO**.
 - 4. After talking with Jesus they know THEY ARE NOT READY.
 - 5. They also know now that they would have been in a miserable situation.
- H. Jesus will **continue to challenge** anything/one challenging the Kingdom.
 - 1. He welcomes anyone to follow that is **equipped** to follow.
 - 2. When He has special plans (as with sending the 70) he desires those He uses to be fit for the task.
 - 3. He is actually dealing mercifully with these 3 men ... and with us as well.
- I. FOLLOWING MEANS LEAVING. We have just looked at three scenarios that challenged the call to LEAVE and FOLLOW.
- J. What is the priority in your life that trumps Jesus?
- K. Are you ready to leave it in order to follow Him?
 - 1. There are those that "ACCOMPANY" Jesus.
 - 2. There are those that are "STUDENTS" of Jesus.
 - 3. There are those that "FOLLOW" Jesus...
